Voters' Guide to Judicial Election & Retention

The importance of judicial elections cannot be overstated. The current crime crisis in New Mexico is not solely a criminal or law enforcement issue, it also involves the judiciary. Judges play a significant role in the outcomes of criminal cases and have discretion when it comes to 'catch and release' issues that plague our state. Voters should make informed decisions about who is elected and/or who is retained as a judge.

In this guide, we have included factual information about each judge, such as their name, the court they serve on, their political party, the type of race (partisan or retention), their connection to the Emerge program (see NOTE below the chart on the significance of Emerge affiliation) and which governor appointed them. We provide this information to help voters make fully informed choices, recognizing that political affiliation (and Emerge affiliation) can impact judicial decisions.

Another source of information on judges is the **Judicial Performance Evaluation Commission** (JPEC) which evaluates judges using a survey system. It is important to note that the surveys are not mandatory, and the return rate can be low so the evaluations may not fully represent a judge's overall performance. In addition, the JPEC endorsed all judges for retention except four who are relatively new. Given the issues with our judicial system, we recommend using caution in relying on this information.
